Pastor's Page

As many of you as were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ. There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus. And if you belong to Christ, then you are Abraham's offspring, heirs according to the promise. (Romans 3:27-29)

One in Christ

The news is filled with ethnic persecution and fighting. There is the Chinese treatment of Uighurs and the Myanmar's treatment of Kachins. There is the long standing fighting between Shiite and Sunni Muslims in Yemen now and historically between Iraq and Iran, and the long standing conflict between Palestinians and Jews. There are over 200 ethnic groups that formed Nigeria, there is division of the nation along tribal lines. Suspicion, hatred, lack of trust and discrimination influence the relationship between the people of different ethnic groups in the country, and deprive Nigeria real national loyalty and unity.

Then there are the racial and ethnic tensions within the United States. Cries of systemic racism, debates over border policy, violence against Asians, and the bombing of a Jewish temple have all been in the news lately.

One could look at all this and conclude that Paul was living in a fantasy world to claim that in Christ these pervasive differences could be overcome. And yet, that is his claim. Let's be clear. Paul does not assert that all differences will be erased in Jesus. Rather, that despite clear difference Christ unites us and makes us one. His claim is that our identity in Christ is bigger than the other differences we may have. This is important. Because it means we do not lose our distinctiveness or our individuality for the sake of some androgynous, amalgamated, non-distinct self. We can still be unique individuals. But, there can still be unity in our diversity, because it is our connectedness to Christ that unites us.

Being united in Christ has real world implications. There is no room for white supremacy among those who claim the name of Christ. There is no room for viewing or treating women as second-class citizens or as sexual objects. While Paul is speaking here specifically about how Christians view and treat each other, this understanding grows out of a more general biblical understanding of what it means to love thy neighbor – an understanding that Jesus demonstrated applied across deep seated ethnic hatred in his parable of the Good Samaritan.

Living this out in the world is not an easy thing. The book of Acts documents the tensions the early church had in trying to find its way between the Hellenist (Greek) Christians and the Jewish converts to Christianity. As well, as the tensions between the early church and its Jewish roots. But that is not reason to abandon the struggle or to give up and go home early. Who doesn't struggle to fully live any one of the 10 commandments?



By God's grace we are forgiven, renewed, and strengthened as we continue to seek to live united with Christ and united to each other. May God continue to bless you as we seek to find our way and live out our calling to be "one in Christ."

Financial Update

We have a lot to celebrate at Our Saviour's this month! Thank you for your continued financial support of the ministry of Our Saviour's. Year-to-date giving is up about 8% compared to 2020 and 2019. Year-to-date expenses are down about 9% compared to last year.

Work will begin soon on the Heating, Ventilation and Air Conditioning project and we hope to have that project finished by fall. In the meantime, we continue to worship online and indoors following CDC and Minnesota Dept. of Health guidelines and will resume outdoor services in May as the weather permits. Congregational singing and limited live music is now permitted.

In 2015, the congregation approved a special appeal to pay for needed repairs to the elevator and parking lot, pay off our previous loan, paint and carpet the upstairs education area and support missions. Part of this was paid for with a 5-year loan and we are happy to announce that we have paid off that loan before the final due date of June 1, 2021! Thank you to everyone that has been contributing to this special appeal fund for the last five years! Please continue to support the Special Appeal to help pay for the necessary Heating, Ventilation and Air Conditioning updates and other building needs. Any offering designated to Special Appeal will continue to be used for building needs.

We can also celebrate finalizing our *Growing in Grace* missions commitment. In 2005, Our Saviour's began an ambitious campaign in part to "allow us to . . . expand our mission and outreach ministries locally, regionally, and globally" (from 2005 OSEL Annual Report). This was done in three phases with the last phase ending in 2014. Part of this appeal was to support missions in Tanzania but because of political unrest there, it was decided to spread out that financial support over several years. For the last four years, we have been supporting Iringa Hope, a cooperative organization in Tanzania that provides micro-loans of less than \$500 to farmers and provides storage facilities for crops. In March, we sent the last of these dedicated funds to Iringa Hope to support their mission.

Part of last fall's stewardship appeal was to support Our Saviour's new web site design and implementation. The new web site was launched at the end of March and it looks amazing! Check it out at osel.org!

In April of last year we received money from the Payroll Protection Program, a loan program authorized by congress and administered through the Small Business Administration for non-profit organizations (including churches) to help with payroll and utility expenses. Our Saviour's used 100% of the money received for payroll expenses to keep staff working and continue our ministry. The full amount of this loan has now been forgiven.

Thank you for your partnership in ministry and for your continued financial support of the work we do together as we seek to live the mission statement of Our Saviour's, "*Living as the hands, feet and heart of Christ.*"

Parish Nurse Notes

“Oh, no worries.” How often do we hear or say these words? The phrase usually refers to a situation that one person thinks could be a problem. The person responding basically states the situation does not warrant worry, at least in the view of the responder. Can you imagine a life with no worries? Each day we face challenges that threaten to chip away at our inner sense of calm.

We worry about our physical health, or lack of health; our children; our parents; our neighbors; our protectors; our cities, state, country, and world; our deep divisions; our ever-changing “new normal” lives; our schools; our churches; our financial situations; our food insecurities; our mental health; our everyday lives.

In Luke 12:22 Jesus told his disciples “do not worry about your life, what you will eat; or your body, what you will wear.” He said that God provides food for the birds, and dresses the lilies of the field, in splendor; and that worry cannot add even one single hour to a life. We know this, but it is still hard to not fall into worry.

If worry starts to sneak into our thoughts, it helps to recognize and identify the thoughts as worry. Then, we get to choose what to do with those unwanted thoughts! Rather than spinning in worry, our brains would appreciate it if we would take a step of purposeful action. The action might be to calm ourselves. We can take a few moments to look at an example of awe, such as the wonder of nature created by our Lord. Just looking out a window at a chickadee hopping from branch to branch, can steady our thoughts, and make them less internally focused and more outwardly focused. We can also slow and deepen our breathing.

Then maybe sit down and write out a few ideas that could help in our situation. If physical or mental health is a worry, maybe we could make an appointment to see a provider. If we miss interactions with people, is there someone we could call, or maybe go on a walk? If we are struggling to keep food in the refrigerator or pay the bills could we reach out to Hastings Family Service or a Dakota County Financial Empowerment representative?

During the pandemic, challenges to our mental health come to all of us in many forms. Our physical, mental, and spiritual health interact to create our general wellbeing. When one area of health is stressed, the other areas are also impacted. May is Mental Health month. Support and resources are available for many needs through such organizations as United Way of Hastings; NAMI; Dakota County Public Health; and grief support groups. Someone left a gallon of Froggy's hand sanitizer at the church office while we haven't used up half of the four gallons I got a year ago yet. I know that a lot of my sewing friends stopped making masks a long time ago as well, and I have at least a half dozen hand-made ones. Makes you wonder about all those ventilators stockpiled. Maybe we could market them as vacuum cleaners. You have any suggestions? We are looking ahead to when we aren't Covid focused.

While I am looking toward the days when we aren't thinking constantly about Covid-19, we are keeping up with the CDC and MN Health Department requirements. We don't need to sanitize the pews as that is not the primary nor secondary way Covid is transmitted. The pastors can take off their masks to speak and preach when they are twelve feet away. You can sing along to the videos with your masks on. Yet, we still want to sit together as family units and leave six feet spaces by using every other pew.

Curiously, do you know what atheists are about four times as likely to do as Evangelicals? Get a vaccine. In going through Mom's estate, I found her pictures from Norway. I think I'm going to take up the study of Norwegian paintings. That's what they would call Artery. I'll contrast that with what I've seen in the Cesarean Section of Italy. Don't confuse that with Serology which is the study of English knighthood.

In my first months here in 2019, two very precise Engineering Studies were marketed to the church for \$10,000 and \$18,000. It would have told us what we had, exactly how efficient it all was working, and what we could best replace it with for better savings when it needed it. The \$10,000 or 18,000 mostly would have told us where we were two years ago and where to make basic adjustments to the equipment we had then. I, however, chose not to pursue that then. I also chose not to spend money I did not have then. I didn't add a \$30,000 automation system that only fixed the Fellowship Hall thermostats and its air handler controls in 2019. Their selling point then was we could later expand to include the whole building. I did ask the Church Council to approve a \$1,000 audit of all the mechanics in the building.

That was a good starting point. Oddly, both Engineering Study companies did not submit an HVAC bid.

Now, I'm going to other businesses and learning more about our HVAC Automation and Upgrade four bidders. It's a big learning curve for me, and I'm in conversations and finishing visits to some similar sites. I see how an Engineering Study could play well in guiding the process now as they would have already determined what to upgrade and with what. Instead, I'm spending a couple months educating myself with the guidance of several respected engineer and maintenance folk who sit on the Building Committee. Is a couple of months due diligence now better than \$12-18,000 not spent back then?

The most important factor is creating better air quality. That's the bottom line I'm striving to improve. While the automation and controllers are a large part of the HVAC upgrade, the amount of fresh air will be the marked difference we can quantify. We will also see more energy savings from new components. That's an enhancement for us all. That will be happening as soon as these parameters are contracted.

Staying busy! Look, the grass is greener. Get out the mower. Another season is upon us: allergy.
